

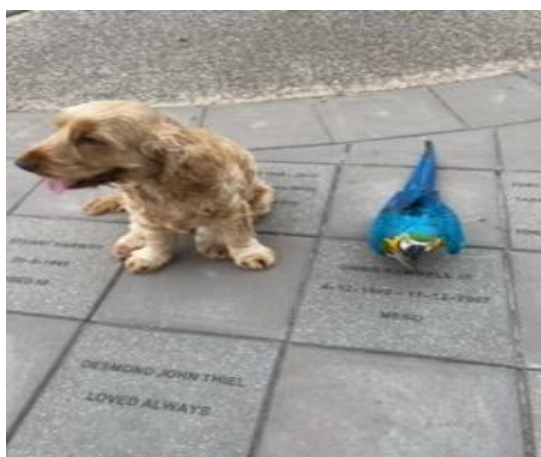
MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT – October 2020

From the Social Worker

It is the start of the Labour Day long week-end, as I sit here at my dining table looking out onto blue skies. I am not frozen for the first time in 6 months- already 24 degrees at 0900, and not blowing a gale as yet! I have just reminded myself of the history behind Labour Day. 'Labour Day is an annual public holiday that celebrates the 8-hour working day, a victory for the workers in the mid-late 19th century. The argument for the 8-hour day was based on the need for each person to have 8 hours labour, 8 hours recreation and 8 hours rest'.

I wanted to start my Spring newsletter report without mentioning the word, 'corona', which has coloured all of our lives, in some way or another. Unfortunately, there is no getting away from it. As Peter mentioned, ADSSA will not be holding Memorial Day this year. It would have been my 16th, as I have not missed one. I notified our celebrant, Jane Ledgard, to learn she has retired. We wish her well, and thank her for the years she has officiated at our Memorial Day.

I have continued to see clients in this last quarter. Only yesterday I saw a widow who has always attended Memorial Day, but we never have a chance to talk on the actual day. Her husband Lawrie, did a stint on our Board. It was lovely to have a chat with Beth over a cuppa and sandwich. She told me she had been bunkered down in the early days of Covid-19, because of her respiratory condition, but she is now 'on the move' again. Just two, 'no nonsense' women, if I say so myself, reflecting on our lives, 'chewing the fat', and in the end, running out of time, because I had a new mesothelioma client to see in a neighbouring suburb. I have always loved having the combination of new clients, as well as my longer-term clients, some of whom I still see 14 years 'down the track'.

I then visited a 79-year old Croatian man who was diagnosed with mesothelioma this past month. He told me that he had run away from Croatia in 1961 when he was 20, at the time Yugoslavia was under communist rule. He came to Australia and worked at the infamous Wittenoom asbestos mine in WA. I think this is the first client I have had in 16 years, who actually worked at Wittenoom. He also worked at the mines in Tenant Creek as a fitter and turner. He has lived in Adelaide for the past 40 years and was keen to tell me that he was never out of work in Australia. He has a very supportive wife and children. Having been to Croatia myself in 2019, we indulged ourselves talking about this lovely part of the world.

This will be our last newsletter to you before Xmas. I know it sounds insane! I saw Christmas decorations in a store last week! I always say that once we get to September, the year has gone. I am thankful that my 3 grand-children, who are boisterous, naughty, demanding and adorable, keep me from feeling dispirited in this crazy world we find ourselves living in. I have always used the phrase "hope for the best and prepare for the worst' throughout my life. I now find that unhelpful, and have replaced it with 'hope for a better future and start acting to make it happen'.
